When our father started to limp and began experiencing prolonged muscle weakness in 2002 it took two years of tests to diagnose his condition. His doctors initially suspected Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), commonly referred to as Lou Gehrig's Disease. Life expectancy with ALS is 2 -5 years. It was Riverside neurologist Dr. Ronald Bailey who donated his time and talent to render a more accurate diagnosis and after a series of tests, research, and medical exploration he told our parents that he believed that dad had Primary Lateral Sclerosis (PLS), a slower moving neuromuscular disease.

Those findings were eventually confirmed by expert researchers at UCLA.

Our parents have always believed in the value of research, education, and training. That's why we are pleased that the Black Voice Foundation, an organization they founded over twenty years ago, has been invited to join the March Healthcare Development campus.

The foundation's "Opportunity of a Lifetime" professional development program expands our mission to educate, train and professionally develop students through internships, case studies, and other experiential learning opportunities. This relationship also continues the legacy our father started as a health care professional in the Inland Empire 40 years ago. As a member of Kaiser Hospital's personnel management team he developed summer youth programs that encouraged young people to explore careers in the health field, he helped develop partnerships with local community colleges to train generations of nurses to work in Inland Empire hospitals, and he recruited minorities for good paying healthcare jobs.

The vision of the March Healthcare Development as an integrated medical community committed to research, education, and training embodies the spirit of our father's legacy. With community education programs, spiritual and healing spaces, and expert medical professionals, the campus can serve as the backbone of our community.

Introducing March HealthCare

This will be the first medical campus in the country to be designed entirely around the needs of the patients and their families.

March Healthcare will be unique in that it is a comprehensive medical campus that meets the needs of patients, family members and medical professionals all within its 175-acre campus.

A patient will be able to see a doctor and then have a diagnostic tests done promptly the same morning while still on campus and also get advice on nutrition or other wellness services.

For medical professionals, the centrally located services mean fewer interruptions in a day and allow more focus on patients. Physicians can see patients in offices on campus, visit patients in the hospital or the continuing care retirement community, perform surgeries and meet with their staff all without getting into their car.
